## **Introductory Comments**

- ➤ Good morning. Right now, you are in the future Alter Hall, the Fox School's new home.
- ➤ For more than 25 years, I have been a part of Temple--as a Ph.D student, a professor, a department chair, and now as a dean—This groundbreaking ranks as my *proudest* moment.
- > Alter Hall is more than a building—much *more*.

- With its central location, Alter Hall will anchor Temple's Main Campus, connecting us to all Temple schools...making us a vital part of our North Philadelphia neighborhood... and serving as a gateway to the greater Philadelphia business community.
- > Prospective students, visiting faculty and guests will get their first (and lasting) impression of the main campus through the lens of Alter Hall.
- ➤ The Fox School has almost 6,000 students, but Alter Hall is *not* just for *business* students.

- > Alter Hall will accelerate our quest for excellence.
- > We stand here...ready to build Alter Hall because Fox, Temple and civic supporters have provided unwavering leadership.

Deans Diana Breslin-Knudsen (look at Diana and gesture) and John DeAngelo (look at John and gesture) —the true believers. Day in and day out... through their hard work, singular focus and love of our school... they are making Alter Hall a reality.
